

In January 2014, Mark Meyer Appel and a group of political, religious, and community leaders discussed building a center where diverse leaders can share and advocate as a unity group. The group consisted of clergy from the Jewish, Christian, Muslim and the Buddhist community. Together with Co- Founder, Dorinda Angelucci, they launched The Bridge Multicultural & Advocacy Protect (MCP).


The center became a symbol of hope in the Flatbush Brooklyn community. The team sparked a "Unity in Action" movement to work on eliminating hate from the hearts of New Yorkers.

Since its inception, The Bridge MCP has hosted over 500 cultural exhibits, musical celebrations, art exhibits, and educational forums promoting 'Unity in Action. These efforts have resonated across communities, from New York State's capital to the White House, fostering a strong, united community that speaks with one voice.

A large increase in Unrest and violence in New York inspired Mark to take action. He secured \$300,000 in private funding to transform a 9,000-square- foot building into The Bridge MCP. At the grand opening of the MCP, Mark emphasized their mission: to stop hate, invest in ways for the New York population to work together, advocate for understanding, and protect children and families.

Mark firmly believes," The greater the diversity, the greater the perfection." Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that." – Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

THE NEED



The Bridge Multicultural Project (MCP) is based in Flatbush, Brooklyn, New York. A city known to be the most culturally and linguistically diverse region in the United States. New York has over 800 different languages spoken by its 8.4 million residents. The city's enduring history as an immigrant gateway has allowed generations of ethnic, racial, and religious groups to establish themselves as sources of political, cultural, and economic power.

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Islam, founded in the 7th century in the Arabian Peninsula, began with the Prophet Muhammad's revelations from Allah, recorded in the Quran. Born in Mecca around 570 AD, Muhammad experienced divine revelations at 40, which urged a monotheistic worship, rejecting Mecca's polytheism. His teachings emphasized morality, social justice, and equality, attracting followers and detractors. Persecuted, Muhammad and his followers migrated to Medina in 622 AD, a pivotal event known as the Hijrah, marking Islam's calendar start. Over time, Muhammad united Arabian tribes under Islam, rapidly expanding beyond Arabia through conquest and conversion, profoundly influencing religious, social, and political landscapes globally. The global Muslim population is approximately 1.9 billion. Which represents about 23% of the world's population. The following are either considered Muslim countries or are the majority of the faith of Islam.

Judaism, one of the oldest monotheistic religions, traces its origins to the covenant between God and Abraham around 2000 BCE in the Middle East. Abraham's descendants, particularly Isaac and Jacob, are central figures, with Jacob's twelve sons forming the tribes of Israel. Central to Judaism is the Torah, encapsulating laws, teachings, and historical narratives fundamental to Jewish identity and faith. After enduring slavery in Egypt, the Israelites, led by Moses, received the Torah at Mount Sinai, a pivotal moment establishing their religious laws and connection to God. Throughout history, despite repeated exiles and persecutions, Judaism has preserved its rich traditions, profoundly influencing Christianity and Islam. The global Jewish population is approximately 15 million. Which represents about 0.02% of the world's population.



The global Christian population is 2.6 Billion. Which represents about 32% of the global population.

Christianity, founded in the 1st century AD in Judea, based the teachings of Jesus Christ. proclaimed as the Son of God. Jesus' teachings emphasized love, forgiveness, and the coming Kingdom of God, attracting a diverse following. After his crucifixion and claimed resurrection, his disciples spread his teachings across the Roman Empire. Key figures like Paul of Tarsus were instrumental in Christianity's appeal, broadening establishing it beyond **Jewish** communities. **Despite** initial Christianity gained persecution. imperial endorsement under Constantine in the 4th century. It evolved into a major world religion, splitting into various denominations over doctrinal disputes, profoundly Western civilization shaping and influencing global culture.






ASIAN COMMUNITY





Join us as we continue to champion the rights and dignity of the LGBTQ+ community, working together to build a more inclusive and vibrant society.








The word Imam refers to anyone leading prayer. This could be a person who is leading prayer in a congregation or a person leading prayer in a group of three or four people. In context, an imam of the Islamic faith generally refers to an appointed congregational leader or scholar. Imams take on varying roles with differing levels of community involvement

Father is a title we traditionally use to greet a church leader like a pastor, a priest, a deacon, or a bishop. A priest is the ordained minister of any Catholic-based Church. In comparison, a pastor is the spiritual leader of any other type of Christian congregation.


Rabbi, in Judaism, a person qualified by academic studies of the Hebrew Bible and the Talmud to act as spiritual leader and religious teacher of a Jewish community or congregation. Ordination (certification as a rabbi) can be conferred by any rabbi, but one's teacher customarily performs this function by issuing a written statement. Ordination carries with it no special religious status.

Parents play a crucial role as role models, teaching children to be inclusive and not discriminate based on religion, ethnicity, or nationality. - Halal and kosher are dietary laws practiced by Muslims and Jews respectively. While both sets of laws dictate what adherents can eat, how the food should be prepared, and which foods are forbidden, they stem from different religious texts and have distinct rules and rituals.
- Halal: Comes from Islamic law as dictated in the Quran and the Hadiths.
- Kosher: Derived from Jewish law, specifically the Torah.
- Halal: Generally allows the consumption of any animal that is not explicitly forbidden. Forbidden
 animals include pigs, carnivorous animals, birds of prey, and any land animal without external ears
 (some reptiles and rodents).
- Kosher: Restricts eaters to ruminant animals with split hooves, such as cows, sheep, goats, and deer. Forbidden animals include pigs, rabbits, squirrels, camels, and horses.



















